AWHF Highlights

501(c)(3) organization founded in 2016 with the goal of providing life saving equipment, infrastructure upgrades and rehabilitation programs



100% of administrative costs are covered by AWHF founders, assuring that 100% every dollar has an impact and reaches its goal

Thousands of first aid kits delivered (helping save hundreds of lives), 25+ DSUs deployed (50+ targeted for 2021) and ongoing rehabilitation

Raised over \$7.50 million from global donors in 2020 and \$1.25 million so far in 2021

AWHF Primary Programs



First Aid Kits

- First-Aid kits provide aid during the first "Golden Hour", which is key to survival
- Kits cost ~\$50/each depending on type and complexity of tools provided





Physical and Mental Rehabilitation

- AWHF helps provide physical therapy and mobility to our wounded heroes
- Education and training initiatives are being implemented as part of the broader plan to return our heroes to a productive life





Defense Support Units (DSU's)

- Deployed at border patrol posts,
 DSU's help modernize and upgrade the front-line infrastructure
- DSUs provide access to showers, refrigerators, cooling and heating, first-aid, etc.

YTD 2021 Update on Key Initiatives



First-Aid Kits

- **21,000 deployed** prior to 44-Day war
- We are currently rebuilding our supply, with the first set of 5,000 first aid kits being produced in the US for our troops in Syunik



DSUs

- **25+ delivered to date**; targeting 50+ for full-year
- Urgent need on the front lines ahead of the upcoming winter



Burn Center

We continue to support the National Burn Center, and support medical treatment in Armenia and abroad, for critically injured heroes



Prosthetics

- 36 amputees have received 41 prosthetics, at a cost of \$500,000
- We partnered with Eternal Nation to provide prosthetics



Rehabilitation

- Temporary Rehab Center in Yerevan fully operational (see page 7)
- Construction started on 7,000 sq ft **Permanent Rehab Center**, set to be operational in early 2022

Training

 Partnered with the Union of Advanced Technology Enterprises (UATE) to provide on-the-job training to over 50 of our wounded heroes each year



Innovation Center

- Through the partnership with UATE we will be investing \$2.5
 million into educational programs for our heroes, while
 introducing new scientific and production capabilities to member
 companies of the UATE
- The government of Armenia has recognized this as a highly strategic initiative, and granted a 77,000 sq ft facility in Yerevan for our new Center

~\$500,000 of financial and medical assistance provided to 864 families





Armenian Heroes Rehabilitation Center

Յայ Յերոսների Վերականգնողական Կենտրոն

- Run by Sargis Stepanyan, a special ops soldier who lost both his legs and one arm while retrieving fallen comrades under enemy fire; Sargis serves as a personal trainer and mentor to our heroes in their recovery
- Equipped with the latest training equipment for our heroes with physical disabilities, helping them regain strength and develop muscle groups critical for adapting to prosthetics
- Houses private treatment rooms where experts work with our heroes to treat specific injuries
- Need for rehabilitation was exacerbated by the 44-day war as thousands of our heroes sustained life-changing injuries; the rehab center helps support the recovery of our veterans



Our heroes receive one-on-one training on how to use their prosthetics. Membership is free to all our soldiers

Armenian Heroes Rehabilitation Center



Innovation & Education Lab

Objectives

- Provide education, training and long-term employment opportunities to wounded heroes and aspiring scientists
- Accelerate the technology community's ability to innovate, design and prototype, with state-of-the-art equipment not currently available
- Support academic institutions with a pooled, accessible resource



Governance & Leadership

- Union of Advance Technology Enterprises (Armenia's largest NGO) and Armenian Wounded Heroes Fund will create and manage the lab
- The lab will be procured and led by an experienced professional who has run a larger facility in the U.S., and will be moving to Armenia for this position
- The Innovation & Education Lab will be an extension of UAT's nationwide Armat laboratories program
- Proceeds from the lab will be reinvested in developing technology leaders for the future, to sustain and grow these capabilities



Location

Part of new technology campus for advance technology companies, located in Yerevan



Service Oriented Offering

- The innovation lab will be accessible to the technology industry in Armenia, academia, as well as foreign customers
- PCB design and manufacturing will support manufacturers of electronic components
- Advanced machining capabilities will support emerging technology companies, particularly in the field of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles



Opportunities for Diaspora Support

- Fundraising for replenishing First-Aid kits and vests remains a priority
- Rehabilitation, prosthetics, and support for returning to a normal life
- Financial support (direct or through 1000Plus)
- Defense Support Units to modernize front-line infrastructure
 - Communities, organizations, groups, and individuals are encouraged to sponsor DSUs; names
 of donors will be presented on a plaque on the unit




- Each DSU costs \$8,500-\$15,000, depending on its configuration, and is made in Armenia
- Fundraising with the goal of sponsoring a DSU offers an opportunity for a community, organization, or family to unify in supporting our soldiers
- DSU's offer our soldiers the ability to maintain proper hygiene,
 while giving them access to electricity, running water, etc.
- Donors can visit the DSUs and see their contributions in action
- AWHF hopes to deliver 50 DSUs in 2021, and has already delivered over 20 units



1000Plus Collaboration

Overview

- 1000Plus provides families of deceased and disabled soldiers with a one-time lump sum plus monthly payments for 20 years, varied depending on rank
- Payments are categorized based on the following groups:
 - **Group I** (complete loss of work capacity) \$20,000 lump sum; \$400 / \$500 / \$600 monthly payments
 - **Group II** (considerable loss of work capacity) \$10,000 lump sum; \$200 / \$300 / \$400 monthly payments

Purpose

- When a soldier makes the ultimate sacrifice on the battlefield, he leaves behind parents, siblings, and often a wife and children
 - In addition to grieving and coping with the loss of a loved one, these families often have to think of new living arrangements to forego rent, find additional employment and new ways to support their children
- Similarly, the program gives disabled soldiers the financial peace of mind, allowing them to focus on physical rehabilitation, mental improvement and adjustment to a new life

Funding

- Every employed person in Armenia contributes monthly to the Foundation
- Additional funds are raised through donations from individuals, groups, and other organizations
