Overview

- Founded in 2016 with the goal of providing life saving equipment, infrastructure upgrades and rehabilitation programs
- 100% of administrative costs are covered by AWHF founders, assuring that 100% every dollar has an impact and reaches its goal
- 501(c)(3) organization focused on humanitarian initiatives

Continued Track Record of Delivering Results

AWHF Founded April 2016
 Initial batches of first-aid kits delivered

- Implemented \$250k in projects
- Continued deployment of first-aid kits

- Largest funding effort at the time, with over \$650k going to first-aid kits alone
- \$10k towards new evacuation stretchers& \$30k to infrastructure

First Aid Kits

- First-Aid kits provide aid during the first "Golden Hour", which is key to survival
- Of the 3 leading causes of preventable deaths (hemorrhaging, lacerated lungs, airway obstruction), 20% are preventable
- Kits cost ~\$50/each depending on type
 - (1) Individual / (2) Squad Medic / (3) Special Situations / (4) Mobile Medic











Defense Support Units (DSU's)

- DSU's help modernize and upgrade the front-line living conditions for our heroes, by providing access to showers, refrigerators, air conditioning and heating, first-aid, etc.
- Each DSU costs \$8,500-\$15,000, depending on its configuration, and is made in Armenia
- DSU's are deployed at border patrol posts along the line of contact, the need for which has dramatically increased with the expansion of Armenia's border with Azerbaijan by ~500km









Rehabilitation Facilities and Programs

- Physical and mental rehabilitation remains one of the biggest challenges Armenia currently faces, and the current program has helped many soldiers return to a normal life
- AWHF helps provide physical therapy and transportation / mobility to our wounded heroes,
 with plans to provide prosthetics
- Education and training initiatives are being implemented as part of the broader plan to return our heroes to a productive life



2020 Snapshot

- Rushed 3,500 first aid kits to the front lines at a cost of \$115k
- On-track to fully support all soldiers with first-aid kits by October
- 2 additional DSUs deployed, totaling 8 year-to-date for a total cost of ~\$120k
- AWHF raises over \$1.2mm from Sep 27 Oct 15
- October 1 Purchased sleeping bags, walkie-talkies and other critical supplies (\$15k)
- October 2 Airlifted 5,000+ individual soldier kits with life-saving supplies (\$126k)
- Week of Oct 5 Ordered U.S. Army kits and 400 evacuation stretchers (\$368k)

- AWHF raised over \$7.5mm in 2020 from global sponsors
- Primary objectives:
 - 1. Financial support
 - 2. Rehabilitation
 - 3. Education
 - 4. Rebuilding

January – July August September October November December

- July 14 delivered 2,000 US-made military first-aid kits to defense forces in Tavush (latest shipment of \$80k totaling \$1+ million)
- June \$15k uninterruptable power supply system deployed at the central military hospital
- Spring \$35k investment to provide disinfection supplies and equipment to Artsakh's military hospitals
- Deployed 6 DSUs at a cost of ~\$15k each

- AWHF shifts priorities to war effort in response to full-scale attacks launched by Azerbaijan
- Accelerated deployment of DSUs to Artsakh
- September 28 Redirected 3,500 firstaid kits from Tavush to Artsakh
- September 29 Rushed critical aid to Artsakh military hospital (\$5k)

- AWHF raises \$6 million since start of war through 3,000+ individuals and organizations across 26 countries and 6 continents
- Week of Nov 9 Airlift of supplies to Armenia
- Continued delivery of critical gear and hospital supplies

Financial Support

- 1. **Direct Financial Support:** AWHF has provided over \$200,000 to the families of our wounded and deceased heroes, as they wait for checks from the government / 1000Plus
- 2. 1000Plus: AWHF continues to be the U.S. partner for the Insurance Foundation for Servicemen (www.1000Plus.am) and have transferred over \$122,000 of directed donations since we began on 11/1/20



Medical and Rehabilitation Support

- **1. Burn Center:** AWHF has provided over \$10,000 of critical supplies to the Yerevan Burn Center, where victims of White Phosphorus attacks are still being treated
 - a. In addition, we are funding an internationally recognized expert to collect and document evidence of Azeri war crimes
- 2. **Prosthetics:** We are partnering with Eternal Nation and other organizations to provide prosthetics for our soldiers and have committed at least \$500,000 to this initiative
- **3. Rehab Initiative:** we have established a new rehabilitation center to provide outpatient physical therapy services to injured heroes, with a focus on prosthetics. We have brought together a proven team of therapists who share our focus on delivering results
 - **a. Temporary Rehab Center:** We recently opened our temporary rehab facility in Yerevan, under the leadership of Lt. Col. Sargis Stepanyan, who is a triple-amputee national hero with extensive personal experience in this field. This temporary center will function until our new building is completed
 - **b. Permanent Rehab Center:** We will soon be breaking ground on a new 7,000 sq ft building in Yerevan that will be completed by end of 2021, and house our current training facility as well as the new rehabilitation center. We will continue to partner with Sargis Stepanyan and Legends Gym Armenia for this initiative. AWHF has sponsored Legends Gym and the Armenian Paralympic Arm-Wrestling team since its inception. *The Toufayan family in New Jersey has generously agreed to support this* ~\$300,000 capital project
- **4. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder ("PTSD"):** we also believe that the mental health and wellness of our soldiers is as important as their physical wellbeing. The conversations regarding this project are very preliminary

Key Initiatives (Cont'd)



Education and Training Support

- **Training:** While rehab is a priority, education and training is the logical next step for our heroes. We are working with various organizations (e.g., Union of Advanced Technology Enterprises) to provide on-the-job training to our wounded heroes to enable them to reintegrate into productive life. Education programs focused on science and technology training will be a key area of focus

Rebuilding Our Defense Forces

- 1. First Aid/Protective Gear: the investments we made prior to the war saved hundreds of lives. Now we need to rebuild these capabilities in peacetime. Needs include first-aid kits, body-armor, helmets, eye and ear protection, communications equipment, and more
 - 1. First Aid Kits: We will need to replace 20,000 first-aid kits that were used during the most recent war at a cost of \$1 million
 - 2. Body Armor: We will acquire body armor, made in Armenia, at a cost of \$2 million
 - **3. Others:** We will assess the situation and work with the Ministry of Defense to provide other protective equipment, as needed

2. Front-Line Infrastructure:

- 1. **Defense Support Units ("DSU"):** We need to support our soldiers on the border, especially the 500 km from Vardenis to Meghri, where no infrastructure exists
 - 1. Each DSU costs \$8,500-\$15,000, depending on its configuration, and is made in Armenia
 - 2. We have received an urgent request to deploy 50 DSUs in 2021
 - 3. We already placed 10 DSUs so far this year, thanks to the generous donations from families and organizations who sponsored these units

Innovation & Education Lab

Objectives

- Provide education, training and long-term employment opportunities to wounded heroes and aspiring scientists
- Accelerate the technology community's ability to innovate, design and prototype, with state-of-the-art equipment not currently available
- Support academic institutions with a pooled, accessible resource

Governance & Leadership

- Union of Advance Technology Enterprises (Armenia's largest NGO) and Armenian
 Wounded Heroes Fund will create and manage the lab
- The lab will be procured and led by an experienced professional who has run a larger facility in the U.S., and will be moving to Armenia for this position
- The Innovation & Education Lab will be an extension of UAT's nationwide Armat laboratories program
- Proceeds from the lab will be reinvested in developing technology leaders for the future, to sustain and grow these capabilities

Location

Part of new technology campus for advance technology companies, located in Yerevan

Service-Oriented Offering

- The innovation lab will be accessible to the technology industry in Armenia, academia, as well as foreign customers
- PCB design and manufacturing will support manufacturers of electronic components
- Advanced machining capabilities will support emerging technology companies, in particular in the field of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles



Opportunities for Diaspora Support

- Fundraising for replenishing First-Aid kits and vests remains a priority
- Rehabilitation, prosthetics, and support for returning to a normal life
- Financial support (direct or through 1000Plus)
- Defense Support Units to modernize front-line infrastructure
 - Communities, organizations, groups, and individuals are encouraged to sponsor DSUs; names
 of donors will be presented on a plaque on the unit



- Each DSU costs \$8,500-\$15,000, depending on its configuration, and is made in Armenia
- Fundraising with the goal of sponsoring a DSU offers an opportunity for a community, organization, or family to unify in supporting our soldiers
- DSU's offer our soldiers the ability to maintain proper hygiene,
 while giving them access to electricity, running water, etc.
- Donors can visit the DSUs and see their contributions in action
- AWHF hopes to deliver 50 DSUs in 2021, and has already delivered 10 units



1000Plus Collaboration

Overview

- 1000Plus provides families of deceased and disabled soldiers with a one-time lump sum plus monthly payments for 20 years, varied depending on rank
- Payments are categorized based on the following groups:
 - **Group I** (complete loss of work capacity) \$20,000 lump sum; \$400 / \$500 / \$600 monthly payments
 - **Group II** (considerable loss of work capacity) \$10,000 lump sum; \$200 / \$300 / \$400 monthly payments

Purpose

- When a soldier makes the ultimate sacrifice on the battlefield, he leaves behind parents, siblings, and often a wife and children
 - In addition to grieving and coping with the loss of a loved one, these families often have to think of new living arrangements to forego rent, find additional employment and new ways to support their children
- Similarly, the program gives disabled soldiers the financial peace of mind, allowing them to focus on physical rehabilitation, mental improvement and adjustment to a new life

Funding

- Every employed person in Armenia contributes monthly to the Foundation
- Additional funds are raised through donations from individuals, groups, and other organizations

Davit Galstyan

Davit Galstyan was in Jabrayil (Armenian Jrakan) from the first day of the war. For 35 days, Davit along with his unit defended Artsakh. During the war he was diagnosed with a heart condition that goes back to his childhood. He was transferred to Stepanakert followed by transfer to a hospital in Yerevan where he continues to receive out-patient services.

Through personal efforts, **Davit was able to find a position to work remotely with a company based in California.** He was hired as a graphic designer, a position very dear to his heart.

Davit contacted Armenian Wounded Heroes Fund to ask for financial help to buy a new computer that would improve his work capabilities.
